

- Wow! What an exciting and busy month September was! The Kindergarten students have been busy learning the routines both inside and outside the classroom. For the most part, the Kinder
 - garteners are adjusting well to our structured and nonstructured activities!
 - This month the class has managed to study two letters. We have focused on the letters P and U. We are using the Animated Literacy program. This program is also used some in grade one. During the letter study, students learn the name of the letter and the sound. Each letter also has a character and a story to go with it. Feel free to ask your child about Polly Panda, or Uncle Upton! When a letter is studied,

the class also does a variety of activities with that letter (printing it, finding it, a craft, actions, etc). Practicing this at home will increase your child's success with learning the letters and sounds. For example, ask questions like "What is the name of this letter? What sound does it make?" When reading with your child, have them look for those letters in a sentence.

Every morning the kindergarten students have been practicing printing their names, Students are encouraged to print their name with an upper case for the first letter and lower case for the remainder of their name. This is a skill we will continue to practice until students have mastered

In Numeracy, the kindergartens have focused on numbers 0 and I. Students practice writing this number, making the number and identifying the number. We will continue to study a number a week for the upcoming months. The students will also be studying about patterns. We will be focusing on simple AB colored patterns. They will continue to work on creating and identifying patterns.


Language Arts, Science, and Social

This month we spent time learning and setting in place the classroom routines.

In language arts, the students work through the Daily 5 rotations each week. They also started a new writing project that is Thanksgiving themed.

This month the grade 2 students have started the

new science curriculum!

Our first unit is based around objects and materials. The students have learned the difference between natural and human made materials, the flexibility of different materials, and objects that float vs. sink,

In grade 2 social studies this month, the students have been learning all about Meteghan. They have discovered the geographical location, what life was like in the early days, and things you can do/ explore there today!

Grade 3 Language Arts

This month, the grade 3 students have been diving into the Empowering Writers writing program. They have been learning all about adjectives and working on implementing them into their own sentences. The students have

also dabbled with using quotation marks for speaking parts in their writing.

This month the students have also started listening to me read "James and the Giant Peach" to them. Reading to the students allows them to hear expression, pausing at appropriate spots, reflection on what they have heard/ read and asking questions about the authors thought process. The students are also completing writing tasks related to the book as well.



Grade 4 Math Update

In math this month, the grade 4's have been working on the "Addition and Subtraction" unit. This unit covers addition and subtraction of larger numbers, and requires students to regroup within adding, and borrow within subtraction. Most days students participate in math centers. Language Arts 5/4

The students have been getting into the routine of Raz-kids, spelling, writing, and A.R. this past month. They are trying to focus on their work, increase their stamina, and learn how to budget their time to finish assignments each week. The grade 5s are starting small Guided reading groups where we focus on their fluency, comprehension, and word meanings in a short book.

Math 6, Science 6, and Art/Music 5/6 with Miss Bablitz

Math 6

The students have been reviewing place value, multiples, factors and prime factorization. Key ideas they should know is that multiples get bigger and factors break numbers into smaller pieces. As your child, see the difference between prime and composite numbers, and see if they can give you an example!

Science 6

The students have been learning about the properties of air through various experiments. In one of the experiments the students had to make air powered cars that they raced in the school Assembly. See if your child can list five properties of air that they have learned so far!

Art %

Students have completed their Lifelands projects and they are on display in the hallway. Fellow students and staff have given a lot of compliments on the good work they did! Currently students are working with paint, completing an aboriginal dot art piece that originates from Australia! Students have been exposed to cool and warm colours, see if they could give you an example of each!

Social

This month, students have been comparing and contrasting diverse social and economic structures within the societies of Aboriginal, French and British peoples in pre-Confederation Canada. So far we have discussed three Indigenous Groups including the Mi'kmaq, Anishinabe, and Haudenosaunee societies.

Science

This month's science focus has been on. "Interactions and Ecosystems". So far, students have studied the relationships between living and nonliving things that make up an ecosystem, the basic needs of living things, as well as some of the impacts humans have within these ecosystems. Grade seven's have shown great interest in our science projects so far this year, and love talking about different species that exist on our planet!

P.E/ Health

Grade 7 Language Arts

To start of the year, students are working on an Autobiography Project about themselves/their life. Each chapter focuses in on different aspects of their life including their family history, their interests/hobbies, and even a brag page about their favourite memories and/or accomplishments that they are proud of! Students are making efforts to stay on topic, and pull relevant details from their lives to include in each chapter! The students are excited to finish their projects and create their very own book about themselves to keep for years to come!

Daily 5

The grade sevens have developed c great routine in our Daily 5 blocks. Here, students have the opportunity to develop their reading/writing skills at their own pace. Students are given designated blocks to rotate through stations including silent reading time, word work/vocabulary programming, and writing skills. I am very impressed with their ability to focus in, and use their time wisely as a class!

Grade 7 Math

This month, the grade seven students have started their "Patterns and Relations Unit". In this unit, students use patterns to describe the world and to solve problems. Students are learning how to represent patterns using algebraic expressions, and graphing these patterns using a line graph.

NEWS from September

Grade 3 Math: I always like to begin the new school year with a unit on Telling Time. Using an analogue clock can present its challenges with the minute and hour hands while digital time is relatively straightforward to read, however, it's not so easy to understand the passage of time. We will continue to practice this all year. We have also been focusing on subtraction with regrouping. Again, a concept to always review and practice.

Grade 3 Social Studies and Science: These subjects are covered opposite one another, meaning one week of social then one week of science. In social, we've introduced the 4 countries that we will cover in grade 3; Peru, Tunisia, Ukraine and India. We have learned compass directions and where these countries are in the world in relation to us. The focus will be the Quality of Life in these countries by comparing them to our Quality of Life in Canada. This is the first year of the new Science curriculum and our first unit it Matter. The kids have already learned that matter is anything that takes up space and has mass, that materials can change their shape and state, and about raw materials.



Grade 5 Math: The gr 5s have adjusted well to the routine established in our math classes. Each day we review addition and subtraction facts through whole class games with dice or cards and activities using dry erase markers. We focused on place value and have concentrated on the use of small values to the right of the decimal place. Our small group center rotation consists of teacher time, working alone on the new material, reinforcement with a game and then technology time for further practice. Students have been encouraged to continually practice their basic addition and subtraction, multiplication and division facts.
